

Blakehurst High School promotes engagement and challenges for every student across intellectual, creative, social-emotional and physical domains of High Potential and Gifted Education (HPGE). School offers opportunity to all students with challenging academically rigorous program suited to individual ability and talent based on differentiated curriculum, project-based learning and the 4Cs, where students develop greater depth of knowledge and apply abstract reasoning skills to complex topics. Across the school we aim to provide an intellectually stimulating learning environment which challenges and inspires students and fosters their love of learning.

We aim to develop our students to have:

Mathematics

Mathematics is an essential and relevant part of life. The study of mathematics provides opportunities for students to appreciate the elegance and power of mathematical reasoning and to apply mathematical understanding creatively and efficiently.

At Blakehurst High School our programs take into account the diverse learning needs of all students, including students with disability, gifted and talented students, and students learning English as an additional language or dialect (EAL/D).

 projects and external competitions and workshops organised by the UNSW Engineering Faculty
 and UoW Surveying Faculty and the Mathematics Association of NSW
- Information and communication technology capabilities. Students facilitate digital technologies to explore and access new tools and software programs and utilise Google Suite to communicate with their teachers and their peers outside of the classroom
- Perseverance in undertaking mathematical challenges and becoming self-motivated learners. We want our students to obtain enjoyment from mathematics and be able to confidently demonstrate the application of mathematical knowledge, skills and understanding to solve everyday problems

At Blakehurst High School, Human Society and Its Environment (HSIE) fires our students' curiosity and imagination, moving and inspiring them with the dilemmas, choices and challenges of the modern world and its past. 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Creative & Performing Arts

The Creative and Performing Arts faculty includes Visual Arts, Visual Design, Photography, Drama and Music. We offer students the opportunity to explore creative expression through the development of their individual talents as well as learning practical and problem-solving skills.

The facilities at Blakehurst High School include sophisticated digital photographic equipment and a darkroom. Additionally, students develop their skills in design through the medium of clay.

Our staff are specialists in their teaching area with a commitment to excellence in the areas of Visual Arts, Music, Drama, Design and Photography.

Music

In Music students learn through listening, performance and composition. They study a range of music styles including those that are technology based. Students are actively encouraged to be part of the school band or to develop skills in a particular instrument. Students may receive tuition in guitar and choir

Facilities include two well equipped classrooms, a rehearsal room and access to a variety of composition software applications

Drama

This course aims to engage and challenge students to maximise their dramatic abilities and enjoyment of drama and theatre through making, performing and appreciating dramatic and theatrical works.

Photographic & Digital Media

This course encompasses both Wet Photography practice and Digital Media areas, which include tuition in Photoshop, Flash Animation and Film Making

Visual Arts

This course covers the traditional areas of drawing, painting, printmaking and sculpture. Students also investigate contemporary practice in the area of digital media

Visual Design

Visual Design has an emphasis on design practice. This course investigates the way design impacts our world and can include Graphic Design, Costume Design, Architectural Design, Environmental Design as well as the Designed Objects

School Musicals


In the Student Growth faculty, we have

The *Bidjigal Learning Place* has a wide collection of non-fiction resources available to borrow. We have a growing range of fiction including novels, picture books and graphic novels. Students are encouraged to enjoy our resources and stay connected by accessing Oliver, our library catalogue at school or from home.

Our online subscriptions include:

- Audio Books and E-Books
- Britannica Online Encyclopaedia

Our Space

Our library is the centre of learning in our school. We have flexible learning spaces and comfortable furniture for relaxation, collaboration and individual study. Our space can transform with a moment's notice, accommodating a wide range of activities.

Homework Centre

This longstanding program is facilitated through the library. Two afternoons each week, students are encouraged to remain behind at school and obtain teacher support, to complete tasks, use resources, or simply, have a quiet space to work.

Bring Your Own Device – BYOD

The BYOD program is facilitated through the library with intensive orientation for new students as well as ongoing support. Library staff support students to troubleshoot laptop issues and help students with their printing needs.

Library Lessons

Years 7 and 8 have one timetabled English lesson in the library each cycle, affording them full use of the library resources, and a tailored learning experience. In collaboration with classroom teachers, the teacher librarian designs activities that complement learning in English. Senior classes also access the library space, with a strong focus on research and referencing skills.

Sport

At Blakehurst High School we offer a variety of different sporting options for students from Years 7-12.

Students from Years 7-10 participate in compulsory sporting activities every Wednesday at Blakehurst High School. Two options are been Grade Sport and Recreational Sports.

Grade Sport is where students participate and compete in a variety of sports against other schools in the St George Zone area. Grade Sport is broken up into Summer (Terms 1 and 4) and Winter (Terms 2 and 3). Students have the choice of such sports as Table Tennis, Soccer, Basketball, Oztag, Volleyball and Tennis. Blakehurst High School have reached finals in Grade Sport competition every year and have achieve success in multiple sports.

The other sporting options students have on a Wednesday is recreational sports. These are non competitive sports that students can participate in. They include Flipout, Tenpin Bowling, Gardening, Yoga, Stream Watch (an interactive science program) and walking. These sports are available all year and cater for students who don't want to play competitive sports.

Blakehurst High School competes in the St George Zone for Swimming, Cross Country and Athletics. Blakehurst has achieved excellent results at these carnivals with multiple age champions every year and record holders in all disciplines. Success at the Zone Carnival then leads to Sydney East Regional Carnivals and then to Combined High School State Championships.

We offer a variety of sports for students to participate in Sydney East Knockout Competitions. These sports include Soccer, Basketball, Volleyball, Cricket, Table Tennis and many more. Blakehurst won the 2023 Sydney East Boys Squash Title and were quarter finalist in Basketball, Boys Soccer, Boys Tennis in 2023. By allowing students to participate in these sporting teams it is an opportunity for students to demonstrate our core school values of rigour, integrity and empathy on the sporting fields.

At Blakehurst High School we also offer our students to participate in Sporting competitions such as Bill Turner Cup, State Futsal, State Oztag and Sharks Shield Basketball competitions which are very popular with students and therefore achieving excellent results.



Careers & Transition Team

At Blakehurst High School our students and parents/carers can access information, resources, and career advice on a wide range of topics. Our Careers Adviser *Mrs Sophia Koutsoukos* and Transition Adviser *Mrs Marie Tsambourlis* assist students by providing:

- Individual career interviews for all Year 12 students and other students upon request
- Information and advice on post school pathways and beyond
- Assistance with university admissions, early entry applications, scholarships, and alternative entry programs
- Assistance with resumes, job search and job applications
- Individual meetings with students and parents/carers to discuss transition pathways and options.
- Excursions, workshops and White Card training
- Information evening with UAC and lunchtime guest speakers with universities and apprenticeship providers
- The annual Blakehurst High School Careers Expo
- Careers Newsletter with information updates emailed to parents/carers and students
- Online information on Google Classroom to Years 10, 11 and 12
- Work Experience for Year 10 students
- Display and distribution of publications from universities, private colleges and TAFE
- External Vocational Education and Training (EVET) and School Based Apprenticeships and Traineeship (SBAT)

Homework



Rationale

Homework is an important part of a student's learning program as it helps on what has already been learnt in the classroom.

- Homework allows for:
- Revision of learnt knowledge
- Reinforcement of skills learnt at school
- The opportunity to be extended and
- Student preparation for the next stage of their learning

Objectives and Platform

Our secondary students are taught by a number of specialist subject teachers. Homework is set by all teachers, but not necessarily every day. A sufficient time of two weeks is allowed for research activities and larger assignments, so that students can access resources. When large assignments and special work are set, the library is informed to allow for support at this level.

Homework activities will vary according to the needs of the various subjects being studied. While most homework will consist of completing work begun in class, and preparing for future lessons, students may also be given work to consolidate what they have learnt and to help them progress.

It is our aim at Blakehurst High School that students are supported in reaching their full potential. It is expected that all homework has the underlying purpose of maximising students' Literacy, Numeracy, Technology based and Metacognitive Skills.

In addition to carrying out the homework set by teachers, students are expected to spend time at home reviewing the work they have learnt in class. Research has shown that if a student does not revise the work they have done during the day they will automatically forget 84% of it before the next day.

Homework should be seen by students, parents/carers as a useful part of the home/school partnership, which supports students while they learn.

Follow-up to homework by teachers is punctual and consistent. If a student does not complete homework it is recorded. Continuous lateness or incompletion of homework will lead to a letter being sent home and detention. It may also lead to a student parent/carer and teacher interview and the student being placed on an improvement contract.

Responsibilities

Parents/carers can help by:

- Supporting students in completing homework
- Providing, if possible, a dedicated place and desk for homework and study
- Assisting teachers to monitor homework, by discussing homework with students
- Communicating with teachers about any concerns with homework or their child's approach to homework

Book Work

The Blakehurst High School teaching staff believes that regular communication between teachers, students and parents/carers is a vital component of the teaching and learning process. While students will have the opportunity to use their devices as part of the school's new BYOD policy, we believe it is imperative for students to continue to use their workbooks as their primary tool for teaching and learning. This belief was the premise for our Bookwork Policy.

Students in Years 7-10 will be required to submit their workbooks to their classroom teacher for feedback. Workbooks will be collected at least once per term to monitor ongoing student progress and provide regular feedback. Teachers will be reviewing the completion of class and homework tasks and students will be given feedback on the following elements of their bookwork:

- Work completion classwork is complete and current, homework tasks submitted on time
- **Standard of completed work** adherence to task instructions, organised and ordered chronologically, depth and detail in work
- **Book presentation and neatness** headings, dates, margins, worksheets glued into workbook, use of correct pen colours, handwriting
- Literacy/writing skills effort to ensure spelling, grammar, punctuation, sentence structure and syntax are correct, development of vocabulary
- **Student application in class** work ethic, following teacher instructions, participation in class discussion, respect for staff, students and classroom

A key component of this book-checking process will be the requirement that parents/carers sight and sign off on the teacher feedback within one week of the books being returned to students. This process will strive towards ensuring that teachers, students and parents/carers can remain collectively aligned in our goals to improve student outcomes.



Mobile Phone & Wearable Devices Policy & Procedure

In accordance with the NSW Department of Education Students Use of Mobile Phones in Schools Policy, Blakehurst High School will implement the BHS Student Mobile Phone and Smart Devices Management Plan. The use of mobile phones and smart devices during school hours will be managed by a gate-to-gate approach using an "off and away" strategy.

Student Expectations

- Students may not use mobile phones and other personal electronic devices while on school grounds at any time. 'School grounds' extends to school excursions, sports carnivals, and other events at the school or off site where an approved school activity takes place, unless otherwise advised.
- Mobile phones are to be 'off and away all day' from the time students enter school grounds in the morning until have leave school grounds at the end of the day. This includes before school and at break times.
- Students must switch their smart watch to 'aeroplane mode' for the duration of the school day.
- BYOD or school issued laptops are NOT part of the ban
- Teachers may also request or allow students to use listening accessories with their laptops as required for learning activities
- Students who do not comply with the policy will be directed to go the front office and hand in their phone. They will receive an off and away slip to show to their teacher, date and time stamped. The phone will be securely stored in the office for collection at the end of the day from a Deputy Principal. Office staff will record on the Daily Phone Register. The Deputy Principal will record the incidents on Sentral and notify parents/carers. Failure to follow the discipline code will incur more severe consequences, including Formal Caution to Suspend, or a Suspension, for persistent failure to follow school procedures and the Schools Behaviour and Discipline Procedures.
- Students must take full responsibility for any mobile phone or similar device brought to school. The school or staff will not be responsible for their loss, theft, or damage. Students who bring their devices to school, do so at their own risk.

Purchasing at the canteen

Students will be required to use a card/cash to pay for purchases at the canteen. Phones are not to be used for purchases, including those who have an exemption.

Exemptions/Accommodations

Exemptions for medical purposes may be given after direct negotiation with the Principal.

Parent/Carer Expectations

- Contact between students and their parents/carers will be through the school office during the hours of 8.15am and 3.15pm. Contact the school Front Office on (02) 9546 3281 to pass on messages rather than contacting a student directly on their device.
- Understand that the school takes no responsibility for loss or damage to phones or personal electronic devices.
- Work collaborated with the school and help reinforce Blakehurst High School's Mobile Phone Policy (Personal Devices) with their child/ren.

Mobile Phone – Non-Compliance

Students who fail to follow the instructions or are observed with their phone or device out whilst in school, will be asked to take their phone or device to the office immediately. If the student does not comply the teacher will report to the Head Teacher or another Executive to come and intervene. The student will be removed from class, or the playground and parents/carers called.

First Offence: Level 1 The student will need to take their phone or device to the Student Administration Office. The phone will be returned at the end of the school day. Logged in Sentral.

Second Offence: Level 2 The student will need to take their phone or device to the Student Administration Office. Parents/carers will be required to collect the phone and discuss the persistent disobedience. Logged in Sentral


Third Offence: Level 3 The student will need to take their phone or device to Student Administration Office. Parents/carers will need to collect the phone and discuss the persistent disobedience. Student will be placed in the Reflection Room. A Formal Caution will be issued. Parents/carers will be notified of both these actions. Logged in Sentral.

Continued Offences: Will lead to further management actions. If students are rude or offensive to staff, they will automatically be given a Formal Caution by a Deputy Principal and be placed in the reflection room. It is important to note that restorative inclusive conversations will occur at every stage.

Student Recognition & Presentation Day

In 2025, Blakehurst High School will launch a new Student Recognition System. Students will receive awards for displaying Academic Excellence, Community Spirit and our School Values of Integrity, Rigour and Empathy.

Students will accumulate recognition points which will see them move through Bronze, Silver, Gold and Principal's Award levels.

Student Voice

Student Leaders

Student leaders at Blakehurst High School have an important leadership role in the school and enhancing the community's respect for the school. Student leaders are expected to display behaviour of the highset standard at all times, show leadership in the playground and beyond the school gates, and encourage responsible behaviour in other students. School leaders fulfil a number of roles at official functions and representing the school.

Student Representative Council (SRC)

The SRC is a student-led group consisting of students from Years 7-11. These students represent the opinions, interests and needs of all students from across the school. The SRC completes two major projects each year with the aim of improving the school and the relationship we have with other organisations in our community. To fund for these major projects, the SRC runs various events and fundraisers throughout the year.



Senior Prefects and Junior Prefects

Each year up to 14 senior students are selected to be Prefects. The selection process is based on written applications followed by an interview. The selection criteria includes evidence of an extensive involvement in school life such as Interact, SRC, Peer Support, school sport, debating, fund raising, environmental team and peer tutoring. Students must have a very good attendance record and be held in high regard by the school community. Students must have demonstrated leadership qualities and a commitment to carrying out their duties as Prefects.

The Senior Prefects abide not only by the school's values of *INTEGRITY*, *RIGOUR* and *EMPATHY* but also by the pledge they undertake where they promise to do their best to be a positive role model for other students as well as proactively maintaining the school reputation to assist with the efficient operation of the school wherever possible. They maintain they "will at all times and in all places maintain the honour of my school, for what I am, my school will be".

Peer Support Leaders

Peer Support Leaders are Year 10 students who assist new Year 7 students in the transition from Year 6 to Year 7. This programme operates throughout the year. The programme places trained Year 10 students in contact with a small group of Year 7 students for a variety of activities which help Year 7 students develop familiarity with the school, develop their social skills and make valuable links with older students.

Year 10 students' self-nominate to become Peer Support Leaders and are then invited to interview before students, the Principal, Deputy Principals and Year Advisors. Successful students have further training to familiarise themselves with the delivery of the course and to further develop their leadership skills.
